FOG FACTS

- ⇒ Fats, Oils, and Grease do not dissolve in water. They are "hydrophobic" or "afraid of water" and will stick to the walls of your sewer pipes.
- ⇒ Grease is found in meat fats, lard, oils, shortening, butter, margarine, food scraps, baked goods, sauces, and dairy products.
- ⇒ Accumulation of fats, oils, and grease in private and public sewer lines are one of the major causes of sewer backups and odor problems.

MYTH BUSTERS

♦ MYTH: I can prevent my pipes from becoming blocked and causing sewer backups in my house by flushing with plenty of hot water and detergents that "dissolve grease."

BUSTED: Hot water and detergents do NOT dissolve grease—it only pushes FOG further down your pipes where it can stick and build up.

♦ **MYTH:** I protect my house and my pipes from clogs and sewer backups by adding chemicals to them periodically.

BUSTED: Although this may provide a temporary fix, harsh chemicals designed to unclog pipes can eat away at the pipes and cause leaks, cracks, and breaks over time. If needed, try small amounts of baking soda and vinegar as a more environmentally friendly option.

MYTH: If there is a sewer backup, it will not be my problem to fix.

BUSTED: Costs can be significant! Residents are responsible for maintaining the pipe that extends from your home to the county sewer, including the connection to the sewer.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- ♦ Put food scraps in the trash.
- Wipe excess grease from frying pans and plates with a paper towel and throw in the trash.
- ♦ Never pour fats, oils or grease down the drain!
